WINTER HOLIDAY FIRE SAFETY

Carbon monoxide is invisible, odorless, and colorless, and can be deadly. That is why it's so important have your home heating systems inspected and cleaned if needed to ensure they're working properly.

Carbon monoxide poisoning could also occur when warming up your vehicle in enclosed spaces, such as inside an attached garage allowing the gases to enter the home.

To prevent injury or death carbon monoxide alarms should be installed on every level of the home. If you plan to use portable electric space heaters, make sure to follow these tips and recommendations:

- Purchase a heater with the seal of an independent testing laboratory.
- Place space heaters on a solid, flat surface.
- Keep them at least three feet from things that can burn.
- Check your space heater for cracked or damaged cords and plugs.
- Plug space heaters directly into wall outlets, don't use an extension cord.
- Make sure your heater has an auto shut-off to turn the heater off if it tips over.
- Space heaters should be turned off and unplugged when you leave the room or go to bed.

As the temperatures drop this winter some residences may experience the freezing of water pipes in their homes. Others may have avoided frozen pipes due to the routine use of a product commonly referred to as "Heat Tape" an automatic electrical heated cable that is installed on water pipes to prevent freezing.

As a reminder, inspect heat tapes each year and replace them if you notice signs of deterioration. Look for discolored surfaces (especially at the plug), charring, cuts or breaks in the insulation, or bare wires, and have a professional install new heat tape when needed.



Apply heat tapes directly on the pipe to be protected, never on top of the insulation covering the pipe. All new heat tapes should have a 3-prong plug and always plug into a 3-prong outlet to make sure the heat tape is grounded.

Check installation instructions when you change types or brands of heat tape because different heat tapes have different installation requirements.

Put a freeze on winter holiday fires. It's fun to decorate for the winter holidays, but holiday decorations can increase your risk for a home fire. As you deck the halls this season, be fire smart:

- More than half of the home decoration fires in December are started by candles.
- More than 1/3 of all home decoration fires are started by candles
- The top 3 days for home candle fires are Christmas Day, New Year's Day and New Year's Eve.
- Keep candles at least 12 inches away from anything that burns.
- Although Christmas tree fires are not common, when they do occur, they are dangerous. On average, 1 of every 45 reported home Christmas tree fires resulted in death.
- A heat source too close to the Christmas tree causes 1 in every 4 winter fires.
- Read manufacturer's instructions for the number of light strands to connect.
- Make sure your tree is at least 3 feet away from heat sources like fireplaces, radiators, space heaters, candles or heat vents. Also, make sure your tree does not block exits.
- Ensure your tree is adequately watered to prevent it from drying out.
- Get rid of your tree after Christmas or when it is dry.

SNOWPLOWING FAQ- WINTER 2019

WHEN DOES PLOWING START?

- Plowing will begin on both arterial roads and residential streets once there is +/- 3 inches of snow accumulation with a forecast of continued accumulation.

HAS THE NEIGHBORHOOD SCHEDULE CHANGED?

- There is not a set schedule for the order in which the assigned zone areas will be plowed. This is based on the severity of the weather and the critical needs at the time.

SNOW BUDDY PROGRAM, FOR ASSISTANCE OR TO VOLUNTEER:

- Call for more information at 406-237-6146. Snow buddies only assist with the shoveling of sidewalks.

WHICH ROADS ARE PLOWED TO THE SIDE OR TO THE CENTER?

- There are a handful of arterial streets currently assessed to be plowed to center and have the snow removed, all others will be plowed to the side. Visit our website or follow us on Facebook to learn more.

WHAT IS USED FOR DEICING?

- Sand mixture containing 10% sodium chloride (salt).
- Liquid Chemical for hills and intersections as needed.


IMPORTANT INFORMATION:

- Depending on the sever-

ity of the storm, and after major routes have been completed, sanding units will move into other areas with controlled intersections and hills. Sanding and de-icing will occur when streets are snow packed or icy.

- Billings Municipal Code, (Sec. 22-406 Sidewalk snow removal policy) states that the resident is responsible for clearing snow and ice from their sidewalk within 24hrs after a snow storm. Also, the code states that you are not allowed to push your snow from your driveway, sidewalk or parking lot onto the City streets. Violations can be reported at 406-657-8267.
- Public Works has hired a private contractor to plow residential streets. All of their graders are equipped with snow gates on their blades to help keep most rolling snow away from mailboxes and driveways. We understand not everyone is able to move their vehicles off the street, but if it's possible, moving vehicles when the contractor is plowing streets would be much appreciated.

The CIP is a five-year program that identifies needs for construction of capital projects or improvements to the City's infrastructure. Each update is created with input from the public and direction from the City Council.

A capital project is a project that costs \$25,000 or more and results in a permanent addition to the City's asset through the acquisition of property, new construction, or rehabilitation of an existing facility to a like-new condition.
