Newly-Elected Mayor and Council Members

A new Billings Mayor and five City Councilmembers, two of them newly elected, will be sworn in on Jan. 4.

The new Mayor will be Thomas W. Hanel, a Real Estate broker who retired from the Billings Police Department after 20 years' service. He replaces Ron Tussing, who chose not to seek re-election.

The two new Councilmembers are Angela Cimmino from Ward II and Richard McFadden from Ward III. Ms. Cimmino is

Prepare Before You Arrive at the Airport

Each year during the busy holiday travel season, the Aviation and Transit Department receives a number of calls from individuals preparing for an upcoming trip. The most frequently asked question is, "when do I need to arrive at the airport to catch my flight?" followed by a wide range of questions on the airlines' carry-on and checked baggage requirements, and how to prepare for the security screening process.

Unfortunately, it is difficult to provide a "one-size-fits-all" response to each of these questions, as the time of day you are traveling, size of airport, weather conditions, and many other factors all have an impact on how to answer each question.

For example, while the airline baggage

requirements are similar, there are enough subtle differences that it is important to know the specific requirements for the airline with which you will be traveling. Finally, since the aviation security requirements are constantly evolving, reviewing the latest procedures before arriving at the airport will save time once you begin the screening process. For these reasons, we recommend that travelers visit the website of the airline they are traveling with, as well as the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) site, to help them better prepare for their trip.

All of the airlines have excellent websites that are easy to use and provide extensive information on their checked and

carry-on baggage requirements, how to travel with family members and pets, how to request and receive special accommodations, how to check in for your flight online, and other useful travel tips. The TSA website has "For Travelers" and "Traveling During the Holidays" sections that will help the first time or seasoned traveler breeze through the screening process like a pro.

During the holidays, the one thing you can count on while traveling is busy airports. Preparing before you arrive and allowing plenty of time once you reach the airport is important. The employees at Billings Logan International Airport appreciate your business and look forward to serving you this holiday season.

The City of Billings, Head Start and United Way

Area Head Start students will be warmly and smartly dressed this winter thanks to a project that bought new cold-weather gear for almost 300 children. City of Billings employees "adopted" 287 kids enrolled in Head Start programs in Billings, Lockwood, Laurel, Hardin, Joliet and Red Lodge as a charitable project through United Way. Head Start students come from families whose incomes are at, or below, the federal poverty level. Head Start submitted a list to the City's Human Resources department describing what each child could use.

Workers went shopping for coats, hats, scarves, gloves and boots for children who needed them. The City employs about 850 people full-time. Some of those employees, including firefighters driving fire trucks, delivered the items to Billings Head Start and watched as the kids unpacked the items.

According to the annual point-in-time housing survey, addiction is the number one cause of homelessness in Billings. Anti-addiction and other homeless prevention initiatives are outlined in "Welcome Home Billings."

Mayor's Committee on Homelessness "Welcome Home Billings"

"Welcome Home Billings," the Mayor's Committee on Homelessness' 10-year plan to end homelessness, is approved and the war on poverty begins. More than 400 people worked on the plan and experienced firsthand why the Committee was needed. Interviewing individuals from local shelters and day centers explains why the top four goals of "Welcome Home Billings" are housing, prevention, services and assets. Here are some stories.

Michael and his family arrived in Billings with three suitcases, \$81, and a criminal record. Struggling to overcome tremendous obstacles, he applied everywhere for employment. At MasterLube, a Social Enterprise business that employs at-risk populations, Michael was given a job which helped him get back on his feet. "I'm really excited about the opportunities they are giving me,"

he said. "I can go somewhere and be something."

"Welcome Home Billings" supports the expansion of community-based, criminal reentry programs and increased advocacy for visionary businesses, such as MasterLube and the Downtown Billings Improvement District.

Both Audrey and her husband, Mike, worked full time but lost their car and their home. "We would save money," she said, "but when you don't make that much, it's hard to hold onto it for emergencies." Unable to afford the initial expenses for a new residence, the couple took their children to the shelter. "Welcome Home Billings" expresses the need for more affordable housing and will utilize housing first and rapid re-housing philosophies.

Due to circumstances beyond his control, Stephen found himself

homeless with two-year-old Skylar and was forced to go to the shelter. Without family and few friends here, he struggles to find child care during his late night shift work. Although he has an associate degree in Medical Science, he is forced to sacrifice opportunities to care for his son. To prevent situations like this, "Welcome Home Billings" plans to establish childcare assistance, mentoring support systems, and life skills trainings.

Sometimes, living in poverty is not a choice. "Lots of people at the Mission have suffered great loss of self-respect. Many have lost the drive to get them out of the rut," says John, a former Mission resident. "Welcome Home Billings" will provide more opportunities to help individuals succeed.

Winter Driving Safety Tips

Winter has finally come to Montana and the Billings area. With the first blast of cold air mixed with snow and ice, there were a significant number of vehicle accidents. The following safety tips are a reminder that winter driving takes additional skills and a lot of patience.

Driving on Ice and Snow:

- Go slow and give yourself plenty of room to stop. A good rule of thumb is to allow for three times the normal distance between vehicles.
- Brake gently and avoid locking your vehicle brakes.
- Areas like bridges, overpasses and shady roads may be especially slick.
- Don't pass snowplows or sand trucks. They have limited visibility and the road ahead may be worse than the road behind.
- Four-wheel drive may help you move forward, but is little help in stopping quicker.
- Check your ability to stop when in doubt.

If You Get Stuck:

- Do not spin your wheels, as this usually only gets you deeper into trouble.
- Go light on the gas pedal.
- Try to push your front wheels from side to side to push snow out of the way.
- Try rocking your vehicle, but be careful as this can cause serious damage to a vehicle transmission.
- If you're stuck and have called for help, do not stand outside close to your vehicle. If the road is slick, other vehicles may also have trouble stopping.

Fire Safety Tips

Winter brings some unique, as well as many year-round, safety tips to ensure your family's well-being. The Billings Fire Department encourages you to take the following safety tips seriously.

Furnace Safety:

Check the furnace filter. This replaceable filter works all year long and impacts the efficiency and safety of your furnace. Leave repairs to qualified specialists. The flue pipes carry dangerous carbon monoxide to the outside. Make sure these pipes are well supported and in place.

Fireplace/Wood-Burning Stoves:

Never discard hot ashes inside or near the outside of your home. Never use a flammable liquid to start a fire inside. Keep a glass or metal screen in front of all wood-burning appliances. Fireplaces are a magnet for young children; take precautions to keep them away and safe. NEVER close the damper with hot ashes in the fireplace. Have chimneys inspected annually.

Space Heaters:

Allow for some ventilation when using these appliances. Use the proper fuel and NEVER fill while the unit is operating. Keep children away from space heaters. Allow for adequate space so combustible and flammable material is well out of the way.

Smoke and CO Detectors:

Hands down, the best early warning device in a home is to have

a "WORKING" smoke detector on each level. A centrally-located plug-in Carbon Monoxide detector will monitor the CO level in your home. CO is a silent killer, as it is colorless and odorless.

Take winter safety seriously. Each year, approximately 4,000 people in the United States lose their lives to residential fires. Don't be a statistic. Call your local Fire Department administrative office at (406) 657-8423, if you have any questions relating to fire safety.

Pioneer Park Master Plan

The work on the Pioneer Park Master Plan Update is moving forward. The results of this planning process will develop a plan that responds to both the needs of the community and the capacity of the park. Currently, consultants are researching and collecting data to provide a basis of study and analysis. One tool they are using is a statistically valid survey sent out randomly to Billings households to identify community needs as they relate to Pioneer Park. A detailed site inventory is nearly complete. As the analysis phase of the project begins, the consultants will continue their dialogue with stakeholders and user groups as they synthesize the inventory information and identify park opportunities and constraints. Early in January of 2010, a public meeting will be held to present inventory and analysis findings, development recommendations and to seek public input. City-Wide Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment Youth Survey Update



- The need for additional regional parks, such as Pioneer, 74 percent.
- The need for more organized sporting activities, 67 percent.
- The need for more recreational programs, 66 percent.
- The need for activities for the whole family, 64 percent.

- Youth recreation interests: Sports and athletics (88 percent), special events (83 percent), outdoor fitness (80 percent), extreme sports (76 percent), indoor fitness (63 percent) and family programs (59 percent).

- Top needs for youth: firework display (90 percent), athletic practice fields (78 percent), football (74 percent), connected walking/biking trails (72 percent), dog park (72 percent), weight training (70 percent), indoor fitness center (68 percent), park playground equipment (66 percent), picnic shelters (66 percent) and indoor multi-use recreational facility (65 percent).

- The top five facilities used were: Castlerock Park (88 percent), Pioneer Park (80 percent), Rose Park (78 percent), Riverfront Park (74 percent) and Community Trail System (70 percent).

- Preferred method of communication: Social networking Web (70 percent), flyers at schools (67 percent), public service announcements on TV and radio (60 percent), newspaper (59 percent), e-mail (55 percent) and direct mailers to households (47 percent).

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Dog Parks in Billings

On Nov. 5, the Friends of Billings Dog Parks Committee held a public meeting to kick off a fundraising campaign to build dog parks in Billings. With 80 percent of the households in Billings owning at least one dog, the need is great to have a venue where dogs can romp and play with their owners and other dogs off-leash.

The Committee is planning to raise \$400,000 of private money to build at least three dog parks throughout the community. To-date, they have raised over \$12,000 with donations coming in daily. City of Billings Wellness Committee News

The Wellness Committee is committed to providing information, resources, and opportunities that encourage City employees and their families to make healthy lifestyle choices. This results in lower government operating costs for taxpayers.

On Oct. 1 and 2, the Wellness Committee hosted the 2nd annual Wellness & Benefits Fair for City employees, spouses, retirees and retiree spouses. Fair goers were able to get a flu shot, participate in a health risk assessment blood draw, visit with St. Vincent's and Billings Clinic nurses, experience DARTFISH testing, have their Body Mass Index calculated, test their grip strength, play with Wii Fit®, visit with the City's vision insurance provider, visit with area health club representatives, and much more. The event drew about 300 participants

and was considered a great success.

The City Administrator established the internal Wellness Committee in 2005. The committee is comprised of employees from all levels and workgroups within the City organization. They regularly survey employees, develop Wellness Initiatives based on survey results and the City's chronic disease history, design wellness program activities to address specific issues, and provide a variety of educational opportunities. The committee's outstanding efforts were recognized in 2008 when the Montana Department of Public Health and Human Services awarded the City an Excellence in Worklife Wellness Bronze Award.



Alkali Creek Road Maintenance and Slope Reconstruction

The City of Billings undertook the task of rebuilding Alkali Creek Road just over five years ago.

The project was split into three phases and the first two phases were completed in 2005 and 2006. The last stretch of the road, between Black Pine Street and Airport Road, was planned to be completed when the Airport Road and Aronson Road projects were done to try to coordinate all of the project designs.

When the design was being finished, it was noticed that a section of the road had been undermined. Geotechnical firms were hired to figure out if there was a stability problem along that stretch of Alkali Creek and, if so, how extensive it was. The reports came back saying that stabilization was imperative for the majority of that stretch of road.

The City worked with Kadrmas, Lee & Jackson (KLJ) to design a project to build a wall along the north side of the road. The first half of the project construction was bid and the cost came back so high that the City initially could not afford to build it.

Other options were evaluated and it was determined that the only

financially feasible alternative was to move Alkali Creek further away from the road so appropriate slopes could be reconstructed.

Moving the creek channel has many challenges, including making sure that the potential for flooding does not increase as a result of the work. In fact, by relocating the creek and revegetating the area with native plants and trees, the potential for brush damming up the creek will actually be reduced.

One great byproduct of the construction is that the creek will be vegetated as it was many, many years ago when it was in a more natural state.

So, design is underway for the stabilization project and it is anticipated that the construction will be started in the spring. Also included in the project scope are the widening of shoulders along the road and making provisions for a multi-use path along the north side of the road.

Earlier this year, the City received approximately \$1.6 million in federal stimulus funding for this project.

City employees picked the Head Start project after Denise Hice, an administrative assistant in the Human Resources department, read about it on the United Way Web site. "My husband's parents were migrant farm workers, and one of his best memories is when someone came and got him and bought him shoes," Hice said. Bob Hice was 9 years old when a minister gave shoes to him and his siblings. At the time, they did not have any footwear. "That's the most valuable gift I ever got," he said. City workers have participated in United Way's Day of Caring before, but the Head Start project had a more intimate, immediate feel. "We picked this project because it has an impact on young children in our community," said Billings Fire Chief Paul Dextrus.

Normally, decorations stuck in the ground or laid on the ground are not allowed at Mountview Cemetery. But, as the winter holiday season approaches, decoration restrictions are lifted, within reason. Some people put out small lighted Christmas trees and many put out wreaths in all shapes, sizes and colors. So, please come and help make Mountview festive this year. Be aware, however, that decorations must be removed from the Cemetery before Tuesday, Jan. 19, 2010, if you wish to keep them for future years. On that day, staff will remove all ground-level decorations and any not in regular flower containers.
