Do's

- Maintain your yard - cut your grass once a week
- Plant & maintain a few trees
- Properly display house numbers
- Empty water collecting in pots, buckets or other containers outdoors
- Clean up after your pets
- Keep trees and shrubs trimmed back and up from sidewalks and curbside parking areas
- Park your RV, boat or trailer in the back yard
- Keep your area "graffiti free"
- Take bulky items to the landfill – it's free for Billings residents

Don'ts


- Park your car, boat, trailer or RV on the front lawn
- Store excess trash and debris around the outside of your house
- Let your trees encroach on or create dangerous situations on your neighbor's property
- Play loud music after 10 pm
- Park inoperable or unlicensed vehicles on your property, or on city streets
- Allow your dogs to bark excessively
- Push debris into the gutter or pour any liquid in the storm drains

Do's and Don'ts

The core of a good neighborhood is the type of relationships established among its neighbors.

The first step in building a relationship is respecting those next door, down the street and around the corner.

While people have their own ideas of a good neighbor and a good neighborhood, there are some basic standards established either through the City's code and zoning laws or through common courtesies that make life better in your community.
